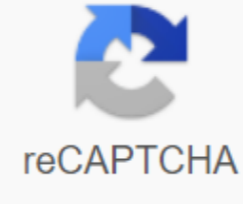




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## Cub scout wolf den meeting plans

With the Cub Scouts family, the reunion of the den is essential to the success and enjoyment of the Cub Scout. It is in and through the den that Scouts make social connections, have fun, achieve advancement, and bond with the pack. Before we go any further, we will cover two topics: a) the basics of the Cub Scout program and b) Den Leader-Specific Training: Basics of the Cub Scout program Den Leader-Specific Training This required course provides den leaders with the information and tools to conduct a successful meeting den (as you probably remember from the video above , a den is a group of 8-10 Cub Scouts and is assigned a number as Den 1; there are several dens within a Cub Scout Pack). This training course applies to all Den Leaders, whether you're leading a Lion, Tiger, Wolf, Bear, or Obelos Den. It is free, and available to you right now online via the online training portal boy scouts of America, My.Scouting.org. The training never expires. When you complete den-specific training, hazardous weather training and youth protection training, you are considered a fully trained den leader. Okay, back to the den meetings. Den meetings should be fun, organized and interesting. The good news is that the Boy Scouts of America have put together a step-by-step guide for Den leaders with everything you need to know, including plans for den meetings. Den Leader Guides Den Leader Guides are your best resource. They contain detailed and specific meeting plans for all required and elective adventures (adventures are the name of belt buckle prices that cover different topics). Den Leader Guides come three holes perforated so you can easily customize a folder for the year. All are available through our Scout stores; you can buy them in the store. Lion Den Leader Guide (Lions are Cub Scouts in Kindergarten) Tiger Den Leader Guide (Tigers are First Year Cubs) Wolf Den Leader Guide (Wolves are Cubs in Second Year) Bear Den Leader Guide (Bears are Cubs in Third Year) Webelos Den Leader Guide (Webelos are Cubs in fourth or fifth year) Parties to a meeting Den Meeting Den meetings have seven distinct parts. These help to keep the meeting organized and structured. Each den meeting plan in den Leader Guides follows these seven parts. Preparation It's time to read the meeting plan of the den, adventure in the manual, and secure the materials needed to run the meeting. Gathering As the Cub Scouts begin to arrive, they join an activity or a game, often led by the head of the den to keep everyone interested and active until the arrival of the whole group. The gathering activity should be completed before the official start of the meeting, as it encourages everyone to arrive on time so that the meeting can start on time. A gathering activity is optional. Opening The opening is the official start of the den meeting. It consists of an official ceremony, usually comprising a flag ceremony, and a group recitation of the and the law. Conversation time This is where the den's business items take place. Business items may include dues, progress of registration, notification of upcoming events, introduction of a new adventure or a new Scout to the den. Talk Time should be brief so that the den can go directly to the pleasure of the meeting. Activities The Activities part of the meeting focuses on the adventure-related activities on which the lair works. Closing The closing draws the meeting to a close. It's usually serious and quiet. Den leaders could present a thought for the day or give reminders about upcoming events. After the meeting The den manager reviews the events of the meeting, finalizes plans for the next den meeting and reviews upcoming events or activities. You can now get den meeting plans for three adventures of each rank online for free. Just go to learning library on the Cubs website, then select your rank. On the left side of the screen, you will find information on the planning and execution of den meetings. Then there are links to each of the required and elective adventures. The first three required adventures will have free full reunion plans for the den. Links to the remaining adventures give you a glimpse of this adventure. To get the plans for all the adventures, you will need to buy the Leader Guides. They are available electronically to make your job easier. Below the links to the adventures, there is more information about the positive development of young people and work with the special needs Cub Scouts. Den meeting plans are developed around a year of scouting program that is presumed to begin in early September and continue until May, when Cub Scouts would get involved in summer Scout activities. Two types of den meeting plans are offered for the use of the den leader: Numbered plans: Program/School Year Programming (September to May), including rank advancement requirements for dens meeting twice a month Lettered or additional plans: Additional programming for dens meeting year-round or more than twice a month Den plans for each rank are dened sequential order. Some activities are partially terminated in one meeting and completed in another. Other activities or skills are natural prerequisites for things that come later in the year from the den. Local conditions (weather, events, etc.) or the schedule of your den can make it attractive to change the order of den meetings. As a den leader, you can change the order as long as you make sure that the change does not jeopardize the ability of boys to earn their rank in the allotted time or or logical order of activities and achievements. If in doubt, the planned order must be used. Discuss any changes with your Cubmaster, as they can also affect pack activities. 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Training.
